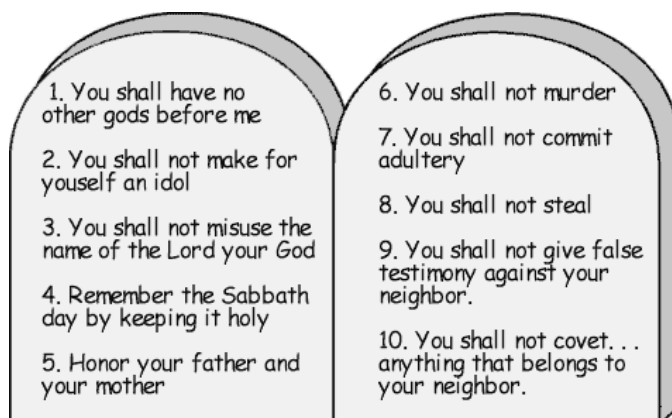

THE BEGINNING OF EVERYTHING

Everyone recognizes the truth of good proverbs, and so they endure from generation to generation. The Russians have a surprisingly bold one that fits this Sunday's Gospel: "Bread is the beginning of everything."

Judging from the first reading, Elijah might have felt that it was too late for bread—too late for life itself. This great prophet was at the end of his rope and endurance. Then, not one, but two angels visit him. One offers food and drink. The other gives startling directions. For Elijah, this food from the angels is bread for his journey. On the strength of the heaven-sent gift of food, he walks to the mountain of God.

In today's Gospel, Jesus offers himself, not just as bread for the journey, but as bread for life itself. He gives his flesh as life for the world. "I am the bread of life" (John 6:48). He is the beginning of everything.
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REFLECTING ON GOD'S WORD

The Passover bread that the Israelites made when leaving Egypt had no leaven in it so that it would not spoil and could continue to provide nourishment to them on the road. Thus it is sometimes called bread for the journey. Of course manna also sustained them on their journey through the desert. And so did the Torah. So deliciously nourishing is the Word of God that some young Jewish children begin learning the Hebrew alphabet by licking honey placed on each letter so that the Torah should always be "sweet on the tongue."

The story of Elijah being nourished in the desert beautifully epitomizes the many ways in which God provides bread for the journey. For Christians, Jesus' words, works, and life given for us are the bread we crave. He alone gives us the strength and courage to "be kind . . . [forgive] one another . . . and live in love" (Ephesians 4:32, 5:2). And, oddly enough, we can find this ample nourishment from the Eucharist when all we taste is a sip and a crumb.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

In an age given to slogan T-shirts, one of the last bastions of "dressing up" is the wedding. Everyone seems to stretch toward the old ideal of "Sunday best" for these moments. In our tradition, clothing is immensely important. Coming out of the baptismal water, we are immediately vested with a white garment. "You have clothed yourself in Christ," the new Christian is told, and a white garment is the token of being born into God's family. Sadly, this is the last time most Christians wear this garb until their funeral, when the family spreads a pall as a reminder of baptismal identity.

Increasingly today, we are seeing the alb as the proper garb for liturgical ministers, men and women. In ancient Rome, sleeveless tunics of varying colors were worn by everyone, and so at baptism the new Christians could be expected to wear their new garb under their everyday clothes. Sleeves were a problem for ancient Romans, who thought they were a barbarian fashion. As is so often the case, eventually the barbarians won the day, and by the third century the long-sleeved garment worn by ministers today was familiar liturgical garb.

5 Simple Ways to Keep Your Faith Going Strong

1. **Attend Mass** – Making Mass a regular part of your family's week helps to reinforce the message that God loves us through all seasons.
2. **Pray together** – Use both traditional Catholic prayers and spontaneous prayer.
3. **Make sacred space in your home** – Signs of your faith throughout the house remind you (and your guests) of what you believe and why. A crucifix, icon or statue of a favorite saint in each of the kids' bedrooms, for example, can help to teach the faith and create a feeling of safety and security.
4. **Practice acts of charity** – Visit elderly persons in a long term care facility, volunteer at a food pantry, or cook a meal for a family in your community who is struggling with a job loss.
5. **Celebrate the family meal.** At the center of our Catholic Faith is a family meal (the Eucharist). Try to sit down to dinner together as often as possible and especially on Sundays. Talk, tell stories and pray together while you eat -- this is what Jesus did and what we do every time we celebrate Mass.

REFRESHMENT

Sometimes we get farther by stopping. To advance we must sometimes retreat, pause, ponder, yield. Elijah was so weary of life and so tired; he lay down in the shade of the broom tree. His last prayer was for death. But instead he was offered the food and drink that strengthened his body and the focus and direction that satisfied his soul. He walked all the way to Horeb. Elijah, this revered non-writing prophet, hails from the area of Mount Carmel. He is the great Elijah who will one day ascend in the fiery chariot to God's very throne. He found his strength and refreshment in God's will and way. Is there any wonder, then, why he is the patron saint of the Carmelites as well as all contemplative souls who seek to ascend to God's presence?

TASTE AND SEE

It is Jesus who descends into our presence on this earth, in the land once blessed with Elijah's presence. Jesus' presence on earth is God's astounding good news for us. It is Jesus who stands on a new high and grassy place and says to all who will receive him, "I am the bread of life." It is we who are called to respond as a people "taught of God" as Elijah and the other prophets were, as the company of the disciples must be. How does one step forward and claim his or her vocation? How do those "taught of God" look? How do they step out on the world's stage, or step out the front door, or into the kitchen, for that matter? The second reading gives us some help: We must appear as a people shed of malice and separation. We must show up as imitators of God. After all, we are summoned to be God's dear children as Christ was God's dear Child given for us.

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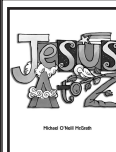
